

## RECTOR'S REFLECTION - MARCH 2026

This newsletter is coming to you after the Vestry spent the day at Bellwether Farm in Wakeman. It was time spent in getting to know one another and learning what their role is as lay leaders of our parish, what my role is as the spiritual leader of our parish, and where we intersect and even crossover. I personally love hearing the stories of what brought them to Grace Church and the enthusiasm around continuing to make Grace Church a place where people come to know Jesus Christ and feel confident in making him known to the world around them.

We discussed A LOT but a few topics rose to the forefront that I think will be the basis for what 2026 may look like moving forward:



1. How do we continue to find ways to get our name out in the community and people into our space?
2. While we are growing our church and presence in the community how do we ensure that the people who currently call Grace Church their spiritual home feel cared for and loved?
3. While we are stewards of the funds that have been entrusted to us thanks to our endowment and as beneficiaries of trusts for the good of Grace Church, how do we continue to reach out and help folks in need?

The beauty of this time together is that we have reorganized ourselves through Committee work to be able to help us accomplish these goals. We have an Invite Committee who works to get our name and our mission out in the community, and a Welcome Committee that steps into play when someone darkens the doors of our church for the first time. We have a Committee who reaches out to families who are going through health issues or a death in the family to ensure they are thought of and to see if there is anything they need. We also have Committees who help manage our investments and our budget, as well as, an Outreach Committee to see where the need is in the community and how we might be able to help.

The constant theme of our time together was that we are very blessed in our church and well positioned to be a positive force in our community and in the lives of those who call Grace Church their spiritual home, and I could not agree more. The more we can move from a sense of scarcity to a sense of bounty the better off we will be, and the less afraid we can be in moving outside of our comfort zones to the places Jesus Christ calls us to – the places he would gladly go.

## FR. ALEX BARTON VISITING

On **Sunday, March 8<sup>th</sup>**, Fr. Alex Barton from Church of the Redeemer in Lorain will be with us and preaching at both services. Fr. Alex and some parishioners from Holy Redeemer run Solidarity Urban Farms, and Ship to Shore.

Solidarity provides fresh produce for community meals and Second Harvest Food Bank. They also teach soil and plant care, mentorship and vocational formation to agriculture professions, and programming for local and neighborhood youth. They also accept Cash, credit cards, EBT/SNAP, Produce Perks, WIC and Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Coupons.


Ship to Shore is a coffee, books and records store. It is also a place in the neighborhood for gathering of locals to hear about news, what is going on, and just to listen to the needs of the community. While Holy Redeemer does amazing work in and for their community and has been improving their numbers they are financially strapped.

At this service we will be having a second collection that will go to Holy Redeemer to help ease some of their financial burden as they continue to do God's work in their corner of the vineyard of the Lord.



## BELLWETHER FARM



Paul Fey is a German concert organist and composer who has rapidly emerged as one of the most distinctive voices of a new generation of church and concert musicians. Born in 1998 near Leipzig, Germany, he began his musical training in early childhood, first through general music education and later with classical guitar and piano. At the age of fifteen he discovered the pipe organ in his local church — an encounter that would shape his artistic path from that moment on.

He studied organ with A. F. Kipping and later with Stefan Kießling, former Assistant Organist of the Thomaskirche Leipzig, one of Europe's most renowned centers of sacred music. Alongside his musical training, Paul completed a three-year professional apprenticeship at Mitteldeutscher Rundfunk (MDR), Germany's public broadcasting network, before enrolling in church music studies at the University of Music in Halle (Saale). Since then, he has worked full-time as a concert organist, composer, and recording artist.

Paul Fey has held the position of repetiteur for the Kurrende groups at St. Thomas Church (Thomaskirche) in Leipzig, working closely with the historic children's and church choirs of the Thomaskirche tradition. This role deepened his grounding in liturgical repertoire, choral accompaniment, and the great German sacred music heritage.

As a performer, Paul Fey has appeared at some of the world's most significant organs. He has played the legendary Boardwalk Hall Organ in Atlantic City - the largest pipe organ ever built - and has performed at St. Peter's - the Vatican - during a Papal Mass for Pope Leo in Rome. His concert activity has taken him to churches, cathedrals, and concert halls across Germany, Italy, the Netherlands, the United Kingdom, and the United States, where he is increasingly in demand as a recitalist.

Parallel to his concert career, Paul Fey has become one of the most widely followed organists of his generation through his online presence. His YouTube channel reaches over a three million viewers every month and attracts a global audience from Europe, North America, and beyond. Through professionally produced performances, improvisations, and original compositions, he has introduced countless listeners — many of them young — to the sound and expressive power of the pipe organ.

As a composer, Fey has published numerous collections of organ music for Advent, Christmas, Easter, Lent, weddings, funerals, and general church use. His works are performed worldwide and are known for their strong melodic character, clear harmonic language, and immediate practicality for working church musicians. He is particularly admired for writing music that is both artistically expressive and directly usable in real liturgical and concert settings.



Paul Fey's artistic identity stands at the intersection of tradition and modernity. Deeply rooted in the great European organ heritage, he combines this with a contemporary sense of communication, digital media, and audience connection. Whether in a cathedral, a concert hall, or a broadcast to millions online, his playing is marked by emotion, lyricism, and a powerful sense of musical narrative — bringing the organ to a new global audience in the 21st century.





Shrove Tuesday, February 17<sup>th</sup>
