## RECTOR'S REFLECTION - JUNE 2026

With a little noodling I think we can all remember who our favorite superhero's alter ego is in the "real world" right? Spiderman is Peter Parker, Batman is Bruce Wayne, Wade Wilson is Deadpool. You get my point. Do you remember the backstories of these superheroes? Do you remember how they received their super powers? It's not a test and I promise there is a point!

Recently, Rev. Carol and myself were at our diocesan annual Clergy Conference; the theme of our few days with all of the clergy throughout the diocese focused on preaching. The presenters (two priests) made a solid point – after preaching or homiletics classes in seminary few of us really do more to hone our preaching other than preparing for an end product week-to-week (or thanks to Rev. Carol every other week)! The few days focused on a renewed way of approaching the Scriptures we have to preach on at the end of the week. It was said that Michelangelo (the sculptor not the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtle) could see the finished product in the hunk of marble or stone he was carving. At times I have found myself trying to find a sermon in the Lessons rather than praying about what God wants to preach to all of you. To be clear – I am not equating one of my sermons with a sculpture of Michelangelo; rather illustrating a difference in approach.

In my new role as the dean of the Lay Preaching College for the Diocese one of my responsibilities is to equip both lay preachers and Deacon postulants on weaving together Scripture, our Tradition (not Grace's tradition, but the church's Tradition), and parts of themselves – their backstories into a sermon. The presenters at this conference were from Backstory Preaching. The emphasis was that every preacher has a backstory and that story weaves its way into how and what we preach. When I was a seminarian I was assigned to two parishes in Ironton, OH (almost straight south from Sandusky on the OH/KY border). The pastor would leave the evening before his day off to visit his aging parents, who were still alive, leaving me by myself in the rectory. I didn't mind. It did force me to get out some, so I would go to the movies. It was the same summer *Batman Begins* came out with Christopher Nolan as the director and Christian Bale as Batman/Bruce Wayne. The movie, I thought, did an amazing job of weaving Batman's backstory into the main plot and climax of the movie – fighting the villain and winning. Almost every other superhero movie that has come out since has tried to copy that – because the backstory of the superhero informs how the particular hero may react in a certain situation. In the same vein, actors often ask the writers, directors and producers what their particular characters backstory is so they know how to play the character – what they would say, how they would respond, and how that story would dictate certain reaction to situations. Amazingly, the same is true for us. Who we are, what we have experienced (positives and negatives, highs and lows) inform our outlook on the world and govern how we respond to situations. For me, it also informs what I preach on, how I preach, and what my relationship with Jesus Christ is and how much of that intimate relationship I share in my life and preaching with you all.

It should come as no surprise that Jesus, being the second person of the Blessed Trinity, brings his backstory into his teaching and parables. Jesus, time and time again, is portrayed as trying to explain divine realities and divine truths to his Apostles and disciples. He does this knowing that human language can only go so far and that their minds/our minds (since the Scriptures were written for our benefit too) can only grasp so much on this side of the Kingdom of God. Nonetheless, Jesus talks about God and God's openness to our having a relationship with God just as Jesus Christ had and has. That is a profound statement! That we, mere mortals, can have the same relationship with God as Jesus enjoys! How?! Why?! Because we are God's children, adopted siblings of Jesus Christ thanks to his passion, death, and resurrection.



In the Old Testament lesson for Pentecost (should we not use the Act of the Apostles recounting of Pentecost), Moses pleads with God to send help in dealing with this new grumbling nation of Israel. God's solution isn't to send helpers – angels – instead God takes some of the spirit that rests upon Moses and puts on 72 elders. While that happened two of the elders overslept (I do not know that for sure) weren't present when this happened, and they still received some of the spirit that rested upon Moses and they prophesied in their camp. The other 70 uttered one prophecy each and were done. Meanwhile, Eldad and Medad (the names of the absent two) were found continually prophesying.

It is my prayer that we realize and see in our own backstories our own life of faith. And that with the strength, power, and courage offered to us by the Holy Spirit we can share our backstory and our faith with those we meet, which is what we are called to do!

# SHORELINE PRIDE SANDUSKY

## A FEW THOUGHTS ON PRIDE

June is a special month: We join the LGBTQIA+ community in celebrating Pride. A month where we spend time commemorating the amazing impact that LGBTQIA+ persons have had and continue to have in our world and in our community. While we celebrate their achievements and contributions to society, we also have to acknowledge the hurt and harm that has been inflicted on them, even by the church. There may be some among us that think it is too much or that we pay “too much attention”, *giving* everyone a month (think of our African American sisters and brothers in February) and the “grief” we hear. Episcopalians have always had a long history of inclusion, of being the “middle ground”. While we claim a common heritage with Catholics there are ideas and polity that we disagree with and find ourselves aligning more closely with our Orthodox or Protestant cousins. We were one of the first denominations to wrestle with the notion of ordaining women and openly gay persons and have *always* sided with the option of being more inclusive than exclusive!



Like celebrating Black History Month our celebration of Pride Month brings attention to this group of individuals who, because they are “different” than the majority have been ostracized and often times relegated to second or third-class citizens. And while we may not be African Americans or find ourselves in the LGBTQIA+ community, as followers of Jesus Christ we are called to “respect the dignity of every person” (as our Baptismal Covenant has been reminding us this Eastertide), to be allies, to give voice to those whose voices have tried to be silenced, we are called to stand with those whom the world has cast aside. In the Gospels Jesus never once aligned himself with those in secular or religious positions of “power” – Jesus is ALWAYS found with the outcast and the voiceless.

This is why our participation in the Pride events of Sandusky is so important. We are the LONE church listed as a sponsor! We are also the LONE church that has a table at Pride to let those in the LGBTQIA+ Community know that if they want to come to church, there is a place in town that will accept them as God wonderfully made them. There is a basic human need to have a place where we feel comfortable – it is why we decorate our homes the way that we do, it is why we have our favorite chairs. Church is no different – we get used to, we get comfortable to the way things are done. Imagine never being comfortable in your own skin, let alone being told you are going to hell for how God has made you; yet, in the same breath, being told all are created in God’s image and likeness?! This is the battle we as a church face (it is a battle any church is going to have to face) – the years of being told that you are wrong or that somehow God has made a mistake in creating you. This is the image and the perception (and in some horrific instances) the reality that we, as followers of Jesus Christ, have to combat.

It is for these reasons that Pride Month is so important. Those first employees and patrons of the Stonewall Inn had enough and fought against the police and the picketers and the people that thought they were “odd” because they were being their authentic selves – *the self* God created them to be – *the self* made in God’s image and likeness. The Stonewall riots paved the way for the gay rights movement in the United States and around the world. In that scenario, where do you think would Jesus be? He would have been with those standing up for their right to love.

I pray that you find time to enjoy the Pride events taking place in Sandusky at the end of the month. I pray that you find time to volunteer at our booth. I pray that we, as a congregation, see this opportunity to truly live out what it means when we say “God loves you. No exceptions.” I pray that we see this month in particular as a month to show forth Christ’s love and our church’s stance on inclusivity and to let this town know that God loves it and *all* who call Sandusky their home. *No exceptions.*

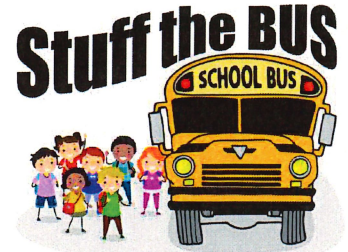
Donations of fresh fruit is always needed and appreciated. These donations help keep the cost of the meal down.
